<u>Centralization of the Homeowner Grants</u> -Effective 2021 all homeowner grant applications must be submitted directly to the BC Provincial Government using a secure online application. Please see the attached sheet for more information.

**Dog Tags** - 2021 dog tags are now available at the Village Office. \$15 for spayed or neutered, or \$30 for un-spayed or unneutered. Cash, cheque and debit are accepted.

**Business Licences** - The \$50 annual fee is due in January for businesses operating in the Village of Midway. Fees can be paid at the Village Office.

**Fire Permits** - Residents are reminded that burning permits are required for all burning within the Village and can be purchased for \$1 at the Village Office. This includes campfire, and open burn piles not exceeding one metre in height and one metre in width. No person shall ignite or cause to be ignited any household waste, refuse, rubbish, garbage, plastic, or styrofoam, industrial or commercial waste.

\*\*\*Please note that there are Open Burn restrictions: there will be no open burning allowed during the peak hours of 11:00 am and 6:00 pm. <u>This restriction applies to all new and</u> <u>previously issued burn permits</u>.\*\*\*

Any person who contravenes or violates any provision of this Bylaw could be liable to a minimum fine of \$500.00 and should the Midway Volunteer Fire Department/Emergency Responder be required, the Permittee shall be liable for the total cost of the fire call per Bylaw #451, Part 10, Sec. 51 (2) (3).



#### **IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR 2021 TAXES**

The Property Tax Due Date is July 2, 2021. Property Tax notices will be mailed in late May 2021. If you have not received your 2021 property tax notice by early June, please contact the Municipal Office at 250 449 2222 or email <u>midwayreception@shaw.ca</u> Postmarks are not accepted as proof of payment. A 10% penalty will be added to current taxes that are not paid on or before Friday, July 2, 2021.

#### B.C.'s HOMEOWNER GRANT CENTRALIZATION

Effective 2021 all homeowner grant applications must be submitted directly to the B.C. provincial government through a secure online application.

#### When can B.C. homeowners apply?

As of February 16<sup>th</sup>, homeowners can apply for their current year or their retroactive homeowner grants online at <u>www.gov.bc.ca/homeownergrant</u>

If the homeowner would prefer to apply over the phone, they can call the contact centre toll free at 1-888-355-2700 to speak with an agent. The contact centre will begin taking applications over the phone as of February 16<sup>th</sup>.

#### Municipalities can no longer accept any homeowner grant applications

#### Where to go if you should have questions?

Starting immediately, homeowners can find this information about this change at <u>www.gov.bc.ca/homeownergrant</u> or they can call toll free: 1-888-355-2700 to speak with an agent.

- The Province will start to accept current year and retroactive grants online starting February 16, 2021
- Their call centre and ServiceBC staff will also accept applications on February 16, 2021
- Note that while a homeowner can apply for their current year grant, the application will not be approved until taxes are levied in May; they will remain in a hold status
- Homeowners can subscribe to receive updates at <u>www.gov.bc.ca/homeownergrant</u>

#### Ready to apply?

The best time to apply is after you receive your property tax notice in the mail and before your property tax due date.

- 1. Wait to receive your property tax notice in the mail.
- 2. Keep your property tax notice on hand. It has important numbers you'll need to apply.
- 3. You can apply quickly and easily online
- 4. If you're unable to apply online, call the Province at 1-888-355-2700

By centralizing this program within B.C. government reports this will:

- Ensure homeowners receive the grant amount they are eligible for, such as the additional grant for seniors or persons with disability
- Automate the approval process for grants resulting in quicker application processing this will help prevent homeowners from being penalized for late property tax payments.

MIDWAY, BC, March 15, 2021 - UBCM GRANT BOLSTERS MIDWAY'S RESILIENCE TO WILDFIRE

The FireSmart Community Chipping project held in Midway, BC this past weekend was an outstanding success. Midway Mayor Martin Fromme stated, "This was a great community event, and I had several residents say to me what a wonderful program it was."

The Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) granted resiliency funding to the Village of Midway in 2020 for a FireSmart project which included an educational mailout to residents and a FireSmart on private land work project such as a community-wide chipping day. The Village of Midway and Midway Fire & Rescue worked with a Local FireSmart Representative from Frontline Operations Groups to implement the wildfire resiliency project.

The one-day event was a surprising success. Residents received a FireSmart educational package and event announcement in the mail in advance of the project and they really came together to participate. The Project Manager, Brandy Maslowski said, "The best participation



I've had in the last 3 years on a chipping project is 32 homes. On Sunday, Midway had over 60 homes with piles ranging from 2 feet to 40 feet long. This is really a job well done!"

Midway residents signed up at the village office to participate and then worked hard following the FireSmart recommendations to clear flammable conifers from the 1.5 M zone around their homes and to trim trees out to 10M zone before the chipper and truck arrived on Sunday.

The crew from Tony Wright Contracting worked from dawn to dusk. They did an exceptional job. They were exhausted but completed 50 homes in a day including some piles that were over 20 feet long. The Midway community gardens was pleased to accept a massive pile of wood chips for use in the gardens. Since there were about 10 piles left over, Midway Fire & Rescue volunteers arranged to pick them up on Tuesday evening.

For Midway Fire Chief Michael Daloise wildfire resiliency is a priority. "Our goal is zero injury or home loss from wildfire, period. Resiliency starts within the first 10M surrounding your home. We had an opportunity to support the residents of Midway in removing flammable trees, branches and debris around their homes, and we jumped at the chance. Forest mitigation alone doesn't help if the homes are not FireSmart. This was a community resiliency project, and we are pleased at how the residents came together."

Residents of Midway can contact Midway Fire & Rescue anytime if they have questions or to book a FireSmart Home Assessment.

Residents all over BC can go to <u>www.firesmartbc.ca</u> to learn what they can do to keep their homes safe from wildfire. Small actions can make a big difference.
