RECOMMENDATION:

THAT Council receives the 2025 Interim Housing Needs report.

ISSUE/PURPOSE:

Presenting the 2025 Interim Housing Needs Report.

BACKGROUND:

In the fall of 2023, British Columbia passed Bill 44 the Housing Statutes (Residential Development) Amendment Act, which requires local governments to update their zoning bylaws to permit small-scale multi-unit housing (SSMUH) by June 30, 2024, as part of the "Homes for People" action plan. A requirement from this act required local governments to update their Housing Needs Assessments by January 1, 2025. The 2025 report is an update to the report that was prepared in 2020.

At the July 19, 2024, Regular council meeting, the Council of the Village of Midway approved the following resolution:

<u>Resolution 047-2024</u> - that Council direct staff to inform the Regional District of Kootenay Boundary that we would like to be part of the larger study for the Interim Housing Needs report.

A request for proposal was prepared by RDKB in the fall of 2024 and Eco Plan International were the successful proponent. A steering committee made up of people with knowledge of housing in the RDKB was created, which helped guide the drafting of the report. Member municipalities; Greenwood, Warfield, Montrose, and Fruitvale were also included in the study. The cities of Grand Forks, Rossland and Trail created their housing needs reports separately.

The cost to prepare the report was under \$40,000 and will be split between the RDKB and member municipalities.

Staff will be working with the Village's contracted Planner on the next steps of the implementation plan to ensure that we complete all the legislation requirements.

FINANCIAL/BUDGETARY IMPLICATIONS:

The Village received \$153,271.00 from the Ministry of Housing Capacity funding stream to help fulfill the requirements of Bill 44.

COMMUNICATION:

A link to the Housing Needs assessment will be provided on the Village website and details will be provided in the Village newsletter.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY: Plan for Housing Diversity - Integrate affordable housing plans with business strategies to meet diverse community housing needs.

Project: Museum Virtual Reality & Inclusive Experience

The project encompasses Virtual Interpretive experience zones throughout the museum. The project aligns with tourism priorities; improves the tourism experience at the museum; creates a new experience & promotes tourism.

The virtual Reality & Inclusive Experiences at the Station Platform; Parlour; Ticket Office & Upstairs Life Screen increases visitors & strengthens the economy in our local area. This easy to maintain project will be enjoyed for years.

The funds will be used to upgrade the electrical system in the CPR Station, to move the project forward. The museum has not been able to secure grant funding. The problem is locating a funding source for electrical upgrades.

<u>Electrical</u>: The unused washroom in the CPR Stationhouse, needs to be dismantled, except for the tub. This room will be the electrical room for the stationhouse. Service for the sprinkler system is currently in the kitchen of the stationhouse and is accessible to all visitors. This would be relocated into the new electrical room. The electrical requires a sub-panel, that will be located in the freight room of the station house. (This is directly in front of the unused washroom). The kitchen stove plug, will be relocated to the freight room, for easy access for music events.

Objective:

The inclusion of virtual reality & inclusive exhibits propels our tourism industry in our community to new heights & assists to solidify the Midway as a global destination. The goal is to increase and attract new and returning visitors.

Main Office (Museum Foyer) Welcome touch screen:

Promotes outdoor activities, parks, wildlife and information that will be available in English and French. When French is included, the site is listed as a tourism site to encourage French speaking persons throughout North America and Europe to travel to the Boundary area. Assistance is received from Sociéty De Développement économique Colombie-Britannique.

Virtual CPR Station Window:

The Summerland steam train has been filmed with their approval. The train will be moving across a screen on a portion of the CPR inside windows.

Virtual Parlour Windows:

Monitors which show Midway farm and urban life. When looking out the windows' the viewer would see and hear a scene from the early 20^{th} century.

Upstairs Life Signage:

Images, video and audio will be on the lower level in the kitchen area. The sign will be for those who physically cannot climb the stairs to the upper level and is triggered by buttons which are accessible to people standing and people in wheel chairs. An additional film is available showing the building of the CPR Railway.

Station Platform:

Push buttons have been installed on the platform for visitors to hear the different train sounds and a cow! This has been very popular for all ages. We require some additional electrical to have this portion function better.





The Canada lynx is one of the four living species in the Lynx family. It is a medium-sized wild cat characterized by long, dense fur, triangular ears with black tufts at the tips, and broad, snowshoe-like paws. Its hindlimbs are longer than the forelimbs, so its back slopes downward to the front. The Canada lynx stands 48-56 cm (19-22 in) tall at the shoulder and weighs between 5 and 17 kg (11 and 37 lb). It is a good swimmer and an agile climber.





The bobcat (Lynx rufus), also known as the wildcat, is one of the four extant species within the medium-sized wild cat genus Lynx. Native to North America, it ranges from southern Canada through most of the contiguous United States and Mexico. The bobcat prefers Rabbits, Hares, Insects, Chickens, Geese

HABITAT

It is an adaptable predator inhabiting wooded areas, semidesert, urban edge, forest edge, and swampland environments. It remains in some of its original range, but populations are vulnerable to extirpation by coyotes and domestic animals.

HABITAT

Both evergreen and deciduous forests, as well as open alpine habitats. They typically don't occur on the Great Plains or other wide-open areas, except along river courses where there is vegetation and trees.

The striped skunk occurs across much of North America, including southern Canada, Striped skunks are polygamous omnivores with few natural predators, save for birds of prey. Like all skunks, they possess highly developed musk-filled scent glands to ward off predators. They have a long history of association with humans, having been trapped and captively bred for their furand kept as pets. The striped skunk is one of the most recognizable of North America's animals, and is a popular figure in cartoons and children's books.

HABITAT

Skunks live in open areas, with abundant populations also they have been observed on agricultural lands. They have been observed living in wooded areas, deserts and plains, and have even adapted to urban and suburban environments. Striped skunks are typically found at elevations below 5,900 feet













North America. having a body length of 40 to 70 cm (16 to 28 in), and a body weight of 5 to 26 kg (11 to 57 lb). Its grayish coat mostly consists of dense underfur, which insulates it against cold weather. The animal's features include its extremely dexterous front paws, its facial mask, and its ringed tail. Though previously thought to be generally solitary, there is now evidence that raccoons engage in gender specific social behavior. HABITAT

The raccoon is a mammal native to

- Trees: tree cavities
- Burrows: They may use abandoned burrows of foxes or woodchucks
 - Brush piles
 - Rock crevices
 - Chimneys
 - Attics
 - Sheds






Otherwise known as 'Wapiti' (named by the Shawnee for the animals' noticeable white rump), elk are members of the deer family and can be 140 centimetres tall at shoulder height. Their fur is mainly brown and they have a long neck with a long head. The males will grow antlers and the females are about ten per cent smaller than the males, on average.

Elk droppings are bigger and longer than deer dropping.

HABITAT

Elk are found throughout southern B.C. and into the US. From the grasslands to the ponderosa pine forest, these animals stay cool during the summer by staying high in the mountains and moving down to feed in the grasslands in the winter.






- Adult males stand nearly 2 m tall and have the largest antlers of any member of the deer family.
- Female moose (cows) weigh on average about 340 to 420 kg while males (bulls) weigh 450 to 500 kg.
- Only male Moose have antlers, which they shed between mid-November & March. Most antlers have reached their maximum when a Moose is about ten years old.

HABITAT

Moose are one of the most widely distributed animals in British Columbia. Found across almost the entire interior of the province, but are usually absent from coastal regions

Snow Survey and Water Supply Bulletin – March 1st, 2025

The March 1st snow survey is now complete. Data from 95 manual snow courses and 111 automated snow weather stations around the province (collected by the Ministry of Environment and Parks' Snow Survey Program, BC Hydro and partners), and climate data from Environment and Climate Change Canada (ECCC) and the provincial Climate Related Monitoring Program have been used to form the basis of the following report.

Executive Summary

- As of March 1st, the provincial snowpack is below normal, averaging 73% of normal (27% below normal), remaining similar to the 72% on Feb 1st.
- The snowpack is higher than March 1st, 2024 when the B.C. average was 66% of normal.
- The Fraser River at Hope snow index is below normal at 74%.
- Due to low snow conditions, below normal freshet flood hazard is expected this season.
- Low snowpack and seasonal runoff forecasts combined with warm seasonal weather forecasts and lingering impacts from on-going drought are pointing towards elevated drought hazards for this upcoming spring and summer.
- By early March, approximately 80% of the annual B.C. snowpack typically accumulates.
- There are still four to eight weeks left in the snow accumulation season. While conditions may change slightly over this period, current trends in low snowpack are expected to persist.




Figure 1. March 1st, 2025 Basin Snow Water Index Map of British Columbia. Larger and colour-friendly versions available in full report.
